At our final evening meal the chance to try snails was taken by many, with reactions varying from pleasantly surprised...... to less than impressed. The evening disco was a chance for many of the students to show off their dance moves, whilst others enjoyed a more relaxed time in the games room.

ICELAND TRIP - A FREEZING BUT FUN EXPERIENCE

A trip to Iceland was mentioned way back in the Summer of 2022 – this trip had been 18 months in the making and involved a lot of people, from start to finish. But my goodness, was it worth the wait.





40 Students, 6 members of staff and 1 tour guide later, we were on a plane ready to fly to Keflavik Airport. For some of our pupils, this was their first time on a plane, for others it was their first trip away from home.

Packed with hundreds of layers between us, we left the mild climes of the UK for the chillier north – at some points, minus 19 degrees Celsius.

As soon as we left the airport in Iceland, we were straight into activities with Val, our tour guide. Our first stop was the 'Bridge Between Two Continents' which was a highlight for the Geographers amongst the team, and then onto a bubbling hot spring (too hot to bathe in) which was a great photo opportunity for our Photographers.

After this, we headed to our accommodation to check in, have dinner and work out our evening entertainment. We were greeted by two lovely dogs that live at the guesthouse who were always joining us for dinner and wanting to play fetch! Evening entertainment involved the use of the hot tubs for those brave enough to get back out of them in the freezing temperatures! Others explored the site and settled into their rooms.



Our first full day in Iceland was jam packed with activity – we visited a Geothermal Power Plant (which has also been visited by Zac Efron in his Netflix documentary), the famous Gulfoss waterfall and Geysir that erupts every 6-8 minutes, and finally topping off with the Thingvellir National Park.

Back at the guesthouse, there was talk amongst the ranks about the Northern Lights (Aurora Borealis). Hushed whispers spread of when the pupils could get up in the middle of the night...



The Northern Lights made an appearance early in the evening (at about 10:30pm whilst some staff were still in the hot tub) so we got everyone out of their rooms. We were all so excited, we ended up going to bed at about 1am! This has been the best showing of the lights so far this year, and with clear skies they truly made the trip a once in a life time experience.



Day two and, as you can imagine, breakfast was a little bleary eyed. However, the Lava Centre called our name! This was an interactive exhibition that was built in 2012, after the last major volcanic eruption. We then saw the famous Skogafoss Waterfall, as well as a trip to the Black Beach, with its perilous sneaker waves! Luckily, no sneaking that day, but caution was still taken on the beach. We also managed to stop at a town called Vik for some souvenir shopping, as well as a stop at an ice cream farm, where everything is produced in house. I have never seen 46 people be served with scoops of ice cream so quickly! Who doesn't like ice cream when it is minus 5 outside? We also finished the day with a glacier walk, allowing our pupils to see something that could be non-existent in 50 years and appreciate just how big glaciers can be, topping off with another smaller waterfall before heading back to the guesthouse.





It was a very early start on our final day as we headed to the airport – sometimes a silent coach is enough to tell you how much of a great time they have all had. Lisa, our coach driver for the trip, delivered us back to Keflavik earlier than scheduled having tackled some really tricky driving conditions throughout the week. We arrived back at school with plenty of time to spare, meaning everyone could go home and have a well-deserved afternoon nap!



I cannot thank everyone enough who was involved in making this trip go ahead, including Mrs Mitchell, Mr Westby, Mr Bennison, Mr Box and Mr Stone, but I must give a special mention to Val, our tour guide in Iceland, and Lisa, our coach driver for the trip.

When you're not teaching what do you do in your spare time to look after your wellbeing?


I read all the time, take my kids out places and occasionally run around Herne Bay covering about 5k

When you're not teaching what do you do in your spare time to look after your well-being?


My passion used to be horses but I don't have them any longer so I spend the weekends exploring the countryside with my dog, Tinks.

2024 INTER COUNTY NATIONAL U18 FINALS - LOWESTOFT

After a year of regional county matches, the 16 most successful teams gathered for the National Pool Finals at Lowestoft in Suffolk. Kent were drawn in the last sixteen against Derbyshire.

Being the defending champions from 2023, Kent were tipped as favourites to retain the title on the Sunday afternoon.

All matches are best of 36 frames so the first player to 19 wins the match. A draw is possible at 18-18 but this would activate a 3 frame play off.

Kent beat Derbyshire in the last sixteen 19-5 in a very one sided game. This then pitched them against local rivals Essex in the quarter finals. Kent were behind all the way but managed to draw level at 18-18, which meant there would be a 3-frame play off to see who would qualify for the semi-final on Sunday morning.



Kent won this nail biter with Stanhope student, **James Goldsmith**, winning one of the crucial 2 frames to give victory at 20-18.

The semi-final opponents were West Midlands who beat Kent in the 2020 final (8.30am start on Sunday morning), so the pressure was on. It turned out to be a comfortable victory, Kent got to the winning target of 19 frames with plenty to spare in a 19-11 final score.

So onto the 4th final in as many years (we believe no junior has ever played in 4 national finals, and he still has another 2 years at this level) and it was Greater Manchester juniors who had come through a tough semi-final against Bedfordshire edging it 20-18 in a playoff.

Kent juniors got off to a very poor start going 10-4 down. They fought back to level at 13-13, then played some great pool to win the final with a scoreline of 19-14. James contribution was again significant winning 10 out of his 16 frames, 4 of which were in the final. However, the biggest frame win was the playoff match in the quarter-final.

Having now qualified for the England Team earlier this year, James looks forward to representing his country in the World Championships in Blackpool at the end of June, this is pending success in the internal trial on the 6th April, so fingers crossed for that, but he is very confident. He also looks forward to four series of tournaments at locations throughout the country— three in the Under 18 category and five in the Under 25 category. The latter contained many "Ultimate Pool" professionals and Internationals, five in the South East tour & three individual tournaments in Leicester, the latter two being men's competitions. We wish James the best of luck!





LUKE TAKES GOLD AND SETS HIS HEART ON BIGGER THINGS.

Hales student, Luke Mannering-Green, recently entered the Black Belt Taekwondo LTSI English South East Open in Hatfield and was delighted when he took the gold medal, winning all three of his fights and earning the title of 'English Champion' for his division.

The 15 year old student competed in the 15-17 year old age group and received his black belt last summer. He has, in fact, been training for the last 7 years at TSA Taekwondo, based on the Eurolink in Sittingbourne. Luke trains 3 to 4 days a week and visits the gym 6 days a week. This hardworking lad wants to progress to training 3 nights a week in London as he has his eyes set on Team GB in two years time.



When asked if he was ever scared of getting hurt Luke said "No but my Mum is. She closes her eyes at times!" A spokesperson from Fulston said

that staff wished Luke every ounce of luck and they are watching his taekwondo career with interest.

Second trip to Sheffield this winter for Alfie Walach who set some huge PBs in March at the National Combined Events Championship.

He ended up 13th in the English Championship Pentathlon and 15th overall in the UK.

SWALE DISTRICT FOOTBALL




Many of our students play for various teams across the county and subsequent leagues and, at the end of the season, some trial to represent the district based on their Schools location (Fulston therefore being Swale district). 




A MISFIT IN MOSCOW-IAN PROUD

STUDENTS FEELING UNWELL

Can you please remind your child(ren) that should they feel unwell they should inform a member of staff or go directly to the First Aid Room if during break or lunch time. A member of staff will discuss the illness with your child and will contact you if it is necessary for them to be collected and taken home or taken for further medical examination.

Please note that the Medical Room is staffed by trained First Aiders, not qualified Nurses. Should your child have an on-going medical issue this should be referred to a doctor as we are not able to provide advice or treatment for such conditions.

Reminder re Uniform and Appearance

We pride ourselves on the appearance of students at Fulston Manor, and we expect them to be smartly dressed on their way to and from school and throughout the school day. If you require any further guidance please do not hesitate to contact your child's Head of House.

Our uniform is compulsory.

Our uniform **must** be worn correctly at all times – this includes on the journey to and from school.

Students may only wear weatherproof outdoor coats in addition to their school uniform. These **must not** be worn in place of their blazer. Hoodies, sweatshirts, denim jackets, leather jackets and gillets are **not** allowed.

There is to be **NO** make-up worn, this includes painted/false nails.

There is to be **NO** jewellery worn, or piercings.



Only those hairstyles suitable for school are allowed – NO unnatural colours

School skirts should be grey in non-stretch fabric– choice of two styles - either straight (with small back split or kick-pleat) or box pleat. Skirts must be knee-length. **Trousers** must be "Charcoal grey or black classic straight-legged tailored school trousers.

Reminder re shoes: Shoes should be black, leather, sensible and suitable for both indoor and outdoor use. Boots (defined as footwear that covers the ankle), trainers and canvas shoes may NOT be worn.

If a student should arrive in school not complying to the above they will be given until the next school day to rectify. (nail varnish remover is kept in house areas and students will be asked to remove the nail varnish immediately and their community card will be signed). Failure to rectify could lead to isolation.

ATTENDANCE—AIM FOR 100%

A reminder about our recent letter regarding attendance. Students should aim to be in school every day of the academic year and there are clear links between good attedance and academic achievement. Students may think attendance of 90% is 'good' but this is equivalent to one half day off each week and means a student actually has persistent absence. A student with 90% attendance from Year 7 to 11 will miss 20 weeks of schooling (3 terms or **half a year**).

Medical Appointments:

Please could parents try wherever possible to arrange Doctor/Dentist and other appointments outside of school hours. If this is not possible then students should not take the whole day off and should attend school around the appointment time.

Punctuality:

Students should be in school by 8.40am and any student arriving to the school gates after 8.40am will have their responsibility card signed. Tutor time starts at 8.50am, if a student arrives after 9am then this is an unauthorised late and can result in a Penalty Notice being issued.

Attendance letters to parents/guardians:

As a school we have a duty to ensure all students attend regularly. The school sets a minimum level of attendance for all students of 95% which is endorsed by the Department for Education and the Local Authority. Any student whose attendance falls below 95% will automatically be sent a letter stating the attendance and outlining further actions that may have to be taken should the attendance not improve. This is monitored fortnightly and students may be spoken to. Where we know of medical reasons for this absence we may not send this letter, however, this will not always be the case.

We will normally authorise up to 3 days of absence if we have been informed as to why the student is off, anything beyond this may result in letters being sent home and absences being classed as unauthorised. We ask for parents to make daily contact to inform us of absences via the House office, in certain medical cases some continued absences will be authorised.

Informing us of absence due to illness does not automatically guarantee it will be authorised, this will be determined by the school depending on the student's current attendance levels and whether medical evidence has been provided. We do not require letters from a GP, any medication packaging or an appointment card would be enough.

Thank you for your continued support in ensuring students are in school. Please do not hesitate to contact your child's Head of House for support should you need it.
