In the increasingly globalized and interconnected world, being able to communicate in more than one language is a highly marketable skill that often commands a higher salary. In fact, research shows that those who are bilingual or multilingual can earn 5%-20% more per hour than those who aren't. What's more, bilingual and multilingual jobs are on the rise. In today's global economy, employers are looking for candidates who can effectively communicate across cultural divides and help expand business globally. And that means that as a bilingual or multilingual, you possess a competitive advantage over your monolingual peers.

4. Better problem-solving, decision-making, and multitasking skills

Did you know bilinguals and multilinguals are great multitaskers, problem solvers, and decision makers? There are multiple studies that show cognitive advantages of multilingualism. For example, a study done by the National Institute of Health shows that multilinguals are much better and faster at switching tasks than their monolingual counterparts. Entry Requirements

Some subjects do have some additional entry requirements. You need to think about these before choosing these subjects:

- Music Students **must** be able to play a musical instrument or be learning to play a musical instrument.
- Food Students **must** cook at home regularly and be able to continue doing this throughout the course.

















What Are the Benefits of Studying Triple Science?

- All students study Combined Science (Biology, Chemistry and Physics).
- If you choose Triple Science, from Option Group B, you will study Combined Science plus an extra five lessons per fortnight, and this will count as one of your option choices. You will receive three separate GCSEs in Biology, Chemistry and Physics.
- If you do not choose Triple Science, you will study Combined Science and still have four option subjects to choose from. You will receive two GCSEs.

What do you need to do?























Research

Research subjects using the online options booklet and discuss courses with subject teachers.

What Happens Next and FAQs























What Happens Next?

- Once we have received all the option forms, we will use them to group subjects together to create our 'option blocks' in the timetable.
- If there are any clashing subjects or other problems, we will be in touch to try to resolve them.
- We will look at whether students meet any specific entrance criteria and generally at whether they are suitable for the, or their, chosen subject(s).
- We will send out your provisional options allocation in June for you to review and request any changes if you need to.
- Final options choices will be 'locked in' in July, and **no changes** can be made from that point.

















Am I Guaranteed My Option Choices?

Unfortunately not.

Your options form tells us the subjects you would like to study. We try hard to give every student the subjects they have chosen, but sometimes it is not possible due to clashes within the timetable or oversubscription of popular subjects.

















What if a subject is oversubscribed?

If a subject has more applicants than we can accommodate, we will have to reduce numbers by:

- 1. Looking at student preference rankings
- 2. Eliminating late applications
- 3. Asking for volunteers to change subjects

If this does not resolve the issue, all remaining applicants will be drawn at random.

















Can I Change My Option Choices?

Once our online Option Choices Form has been completed, you can make changes until the end of June. These requests must be received in writing from parents/carers.

We do **not** normally permit changes to option choices once students commence their studies in September.


















Year 9 GCSE Options Event 2024
