SIXTH FORMERS BECOME TEACHERS AND DO A FANTASTIC JOB!

Year 9 students were in for a treat on Wednesday 12th January when, instead of their normal History teacher, they were faced with two 6th Form students Bethany Hook and Kathrine (Kat) Pike who were taking control of their lesson. Supervised by Mrs Wisbey, the girls produced a splendid and very informative lesson on the Holocaust. Bethany and Kat covered the definition of the Holocaust, the number of innocent people murdered, and described the historical events. The girls also organised an interactive programme where they were able to speak to a Holocaust survivor, Kitty Hart-Moxon and the students learned about her experience.

Bethany said "The main thing I took from this project is the importance of humanising the victims and perpetra-



tors. It is easy to just think of the Holocaust as some historical event but we must think about the deeper meaning behind it. Every victim was an individual with their own lifestyle, their own customs and traditions, their own story. Defining them just by a statistic stops us from realising the true horrific nature of the Holocaust. Similarly, the perpetrators were not just some villains or monsters but were people who made choices for varying reasons".

Year 9 student, Liam Sherrif said he really enjoyed the lesson saying "It was great. It was different being taught by another student and it was really interesting. I learned lots of new facts. Bethany and Kat did really well".

Mrs Wisbey was equally impressed saying "Bethany and Kat had obviously worked really hard on their presentation. It was brilliantly planned with a great combination of information, photos, written resources, interactive video and lots of opportunity for discussion. They posed many thought provoking questions and from speaking to the students as well as the full class feedback, I could see how engaged the students were. They handled a very challenging subject with great sensitivity, allowing students the time and space to be able to come to their own conclusions without telling them what to think. The girls managed the class well, spoke clearly and with enthusiasm. Overall a really impressive lesson – well done girls"!

FULSTON STAFF DON'T LET THE SIDE DOWN.

The Fulston Manor staff football team travelled away to The Sittingbourne School on Friday 14th January, after school, to play the first staff game in five years. Despite playing the game on away territory in a notoriously hostile environment, the Fulston team emerged victorious following a hard fought battle with their ardent opponents.

The game started with Fulston Manor enjoying the lion's share of possession in the opening five minutes. The Fulston midfield were finding a lot of time on the ball and dictated the tempo of the game. However it was TSS that had the first real attempt at goal only to be denied by the gloves of Mr 'Safe Hands' Matthews.

The early attempt sparked the home side into life and

the game ebbed and flowed for the following ten minutes before Fulston gave the exuberant travelling supporters something to cheer about. Patey drove forward with the ball flicking it over the heads of opposing players, the ball then broke to the composed Gardner who found Raher on the edge of the area, the latter then curled the ball with precision from 25 yards out round the goalkeeper and into the top right corner of the net. A strike worthy of opening the scoring in any game.

With their tails up, Fulston pressed forward in search of a second goal. TSS were pinned back in their own half and couldn't find a way out. Clearly startled by the pace of wide players Box and Beaumont, the TSS defence dropped deeper and Fulston came inches away from adding a second when Raher found Patey on the edge of the area, his shot left the keeper rooted to the spot but dipped agonisingly just inches over the crossbar.

With Fulston looking favourites to score the next goal they were subsequently caught on the counter attack by TSS. The young striker ran across the penalty area and sent a well-placed shot into the far corner of the goal leaving Matthews with no chance. TSS then pushed on in search of a goal to gain the advantage just before half time, however their efforts were thwarted by the resolute defending from 'fan favourites' Firth and Adjei at the heart of the Fulston defence. With the rotating full backs Hewitt, Hadler, Deeks & Westby all standing strong to ensure their opponents were kept at bay - the game was level at the break.

Fulston shuffled the pack at half time and introduced the much needed fresh legs of Spedding, Bishop and Belfiore. The beginning of the second half consisted of more intense battles in the centre of the pitch with both teams looking to stamp their authority on the game. Fulston started to turn the screw as the seasoned midfield maestro Lawrence continued to break up play and distribute the ball to the attacking players. Fulston were rewarded for their persistence midway through the second half, an outswinging corner was sent into the box by Gardner and met by the head of Patey, his header sent the ball back across goal to find Lawrence who guided a deft header over the goalkeeper and into the corner of the net to restore Fulston's advantage.

......TSS pushed forward in the final ten minutes in search of an equaliser, however despite several attempts on goal they failed to find a way past Fulston's tenacious goal-keeper Matthews. TSS had a great chance to level the game, but the ball was scrambled away by the solid Fulston defenders and the heroic Matthews in goal. The game started to become remarkably stretched and Fulston looked to their bench for a calming influence. The crowd erupted as the experienced and assured McCutcheon entered the fray to tighten up the defence and protect Fulston's lead.

Fulston had chances to secure the victory in the closing stages of the game with the tireless Raher, Gardner & Box all denied by the opposing goalkeeper. TSS also pushed forward themselves in search of an equaliser, however Firth & Adjei defended the Fulston goal like gladiators on a battleground clearing everything that came their way. Deeks then transformed from right back into a tricky right winger and provided some entertainment for the fans with a back-heel flick. Despite the tension, Fulston did make sure of the victory with the last kick of the game, Box floated in a corner which evaded all of the defenders and found Patey at the far post who sent a low left-footed strike beyond the reach of the goalkeeper.

As the final whistle blew, a bellowing roar swept across the pitch from the direction of the Fulston faithful. The smiles on the faces of Fulston players and supporters was a joy to behold - the staff team maintain their 100% record.

ERASMUS CRAFTS TAKE TEACHERS BACK TO SCHOOL

It was lovely to see that the Erasmus project, run by various governments throughout Europe, was still going strong and, together with our partner schools in Spain, The Czech Republic, Lithuania, Estonia and Iceland we are exploring the preservation of local crafts in our countries. The most recent mobility for this project was held in the Czech Republic and Mr Box and Miss Finn were lucky to be able to travel there to take part in the latest project. Sadly, no students could join them this time which dampened the otherwise wonderful experience.

Miss Finn wrote about her experience:

The 5-day mobility involved the exploration of a different local craft every day, travelling in and around the local area of Nový Jičín, where our partner school, Mendelova Střední škola, is based.

Monday and Tuesday were based in the main school, as well as the town centre of Nový Jičín. We experimented with basket weaving and in the case of Mr. Box, managed this with ease! Miss Finn on the other hand, took several attempts to get started. The main aim of the project was to design and create a board game, using the 6 partner countries and their crafts as the main focal point for the game. This also included having to design pieces using TinkerCad, which could then be 3D printed into real parts of the game.



The afternoon on Monday was then spent visiting the local hat museum, for which the town is famous for, to decorate miniature hats, as well as trying on some of the pieces exhibited in the museum. Tuesday afternoon was then used to visit a local bakery to attempt mastering the art of creating local signature pastries (as well as sampling a few of them).

.....Wednesday and Thursday were used to explore the wider surrounding areas, including a visit to a glassworks where students design and create their own pieces and exhibitions. This involved some engraving of pre-made pieces, which of course Mr. Box was a natural at, and another visit to a bakery in Štramberk to see how Štramberk Ears are made, which was finally a task that Miss Finn could manage with ease! On Thursday afternoon there was a visit to Beskydy Pustevny, one of the newest attractions in the area. This is a huge wood-en walkway in the mountainous region of the area, reaching over 1000m above sea level. If ever there was a need for a woolly hat, this was it!



Our final day in the area we spent at the closing ceremony for this mobility of the project. This was held in the town hall, where all contributors were presented with a certificate of participation as well as being treated to a musical performance from pupils from Mendelova Střední škola.

Our special thanks go Svatava Olbrechtova and colleagues for hosting the mobility and welcoming all of us to their town and school, especially given the current travel restrictions. We also extend our thanks to the European Parliament for allowing Fulston Manor School to enjoy the fruits of the Erasmus Project, learning in adventurous ways both at home and abroad.

STUDENTS REACT POSITIVELY TO BEN KINSELLA FOUNDATION WORKSHOP

Fulston Manor are lucky enough to be part of a countywide project with Kent VRU (Violence Reduction Unit) working towards supporting young people in our area away from violence. We were offered the opportunity to, as part of this partnership, visit the Ben Kinsella Foundation Workshop in Barking, where our students took part in an interactive set of sessions with young adults with lived experience of violent crimes.

We took a small group of Year 10 boys along who engaged brilliantly on the day, with every session, and were a credit to the school. The boys started by watching a short documentary on the tragic death of Ben Kinsella who was murdered aged 16 in 2008. This lead to an open and honest discussion around why some young people carried weapons, with the consensus from our boys being that it was both foolish and a reactionary scared response. They had a session on wound first aid and joint enterprise, which also educated them on the legalities of carrying weapons as well as being a part of a group where one person commits a crime; all can be convicted of the offence. This was eye opening for our students who were not aware of this legal loophole, though not as surprising as hearing their SnapChat history could be fully downloaded from SnapChat!

Mrs Woollcott said "The boys were shown a mock prison cell to talk through the realities of prison as well as their own aspirations for their own futures. This was particularly lovely to hear with almost every student having a plan for himself. Finally, they had a discussion with the organisation around other case studies of young people killed by youth violence, with some really thoughtful observations made by our boys. The boys were praised by the organisers of the day for their enthusiasm and maturity in the discussions and I was very proud of them".

ERASMUS TRIP CROSSES CONTINENTS (WRITTEN BY MR MATTHEWS)

Istanbul; Crossroads of Europe and Asia, modern mega-city and playground of the world's ancient civilizations, a melting pot of ancient religious sites, world-renowned cuisine and breath-taking views along the Bospherous Strait...and for 6 plucky Fulston Manor students venturing on the Erasmus trail in Mid-March, home to the heaviest snow blizzards this side of the Arctic.



And so it turned out not to be Covid restrictions but *flight cancellations* which plagued the first leg of Fulston's final Erasmus+ experience: *Who's Knocking at My Door? 2.* A new project exploring the role of migration in modern Europe. An Istanbul, blanketed with snow, awaited all our partners, with students and staff from schools in Sweden, Italy, Spain and Belgium due for weekend arrivals but constantly checking

Arriving under white skies, with thick slush underfoot, the FMS team traipsed through sub-zero temperatures to the Lionel Hotel, their accommodation for the week in the western district of Bayrampaşa, a stone's throw from Tuna Anadolu Lisesi School, our hosts for the week. With bags unpacked and materials organised for the week, an exciting itinerary was only a Sunday-night dip in the pool away...

Aside from opportunities to socialise and meet students from across Europe, collaborative activities focusing on group-work, role play, and public speaking would provide insights into the phenomenon of migration in all the partner countries. Punctuated by exquisite selections of Turkish sweets and pastries, the FMS students navigated their way through the week's project work and the impromptu blizzards.



Traditional dance lessons tested the footwork of the entire group, Turkish tea kept latenight fatigue at bay and performances from the Tuna Anadolu Lisesi's school bands would practically raise the roof of the local youth centre one afternoon in scenes that would rival any performance at the O2.





True to form, Erasmus experiences provide opportunities to sample local culture and so the Turkish team prepared a kaleidoscopic program of visits; from the gravity defying chandeliers of the Sultan's Palace to Hagia Sofia's otherworldly domes; the winding alleys of the Grand Bazaar and heady scents of the antiquitous spice market, Fulston's students ducked in and out of Istanbul's relentless traffic to sample some of the capital's finest sights.

As the week drew to a close amidst swirling dervishes of snow, the adventurous 6 would feel the all-to-familiar pangs of heartfelt goodbyes. 


STUDENTS FEELING UNWELL AND THE USE OF MOBILE PHONES

There have been a number of occasions when students have felt unwell and have contacted home asking for parents to come and collect them from school without the knowledge of any member of staff. Can you please remind your child(ren) that should they feel unwell they should inform a member of staff or go directly to the First Aid Room. A member of staff will discuss the illness with your child and will contact you if it is necessary for them to be collected and taken home or taken for further medical examination.

Please note that the Medical Room is staffed by trained First Aiders, not qualified Nurses. Should your child have an on-going medical issue this should be referred to a doctor as we are not able to provide advice or treatment for such conditions.

If students are using their phones at unacceptable times, locations or in other ways they will be confiscated and taken to the school office. No phone can be collected before 3:15 p.m. In some cases phones may be collected by the student but generally they will need to be collected by a parent.

REMINDER RE UNIFORM AND APPEARANCE



REMINDER RE SHOES : Shoes should be black, leather, sensible and suitable for both indoor and outdoor use. Boots (defined as footwear that covers the ankle), trainers and canvas shoes may NOT be worn.

If a student should arrive in school not complying to the above he/she will be given until the next school day to rectify. (nail varnish remover is kept in house areas and girls will be asked to remove the nail varnish immediately and their responsibility card will be signed). Failure to rectify could lead to isolation.





ATTENDANCE—AIM FOR 100%

A reminder about our recent letter regarding attendance. Students should aim to be in school every day of the academic year and there are clear links between good attedance and academic achievement. Students may think attendance of 90% is 'good' but this is equivalent to one half day off each week and means a student actually has persistent absence. A student with 90% attendance from Year 7 to 11 will miss 20 weeks of schooling (3 terms or **half a year**).

Medical Appointments:

Please could parents try wherever possible to arrange Doctor/Dentist and other appointments outside of school hours. If this is not possible then students should not take the whole day off and should attend school around the appointment time.

Punctuality:

Students should be in school by 8.40am and any student arriving to the school gates after 8.40am will have their responsibility card signed. Tutor time starts at 8.50am, if a student arrives after 9am then this is an unauthorised late and can result in a Penalty Notice being issued.

Attendance letters to parents/guardians:

As a school we have a duty to ensure all students attend regularly. The school sets a minimum level of attendance for all students of 95% which is endorsed by the Department for Education and the Local Authority. Any student whose attendance falls below 95% will automatically be sent a letter stating the attendance and outlining further actions that may have to be taken should the attendance not improve. This is monitored fortnightly and students may be spoken to. Where we know of medical reasons for this absence we may not send this letter, however, this will not always be the case.

We will normally authorise up to 3 days of absence if we have been informed as to why the student is off, anything beyond this may result in letters being sent home and absences being classed as unauthorised. We ask for parents to make daily contact to inform us of absences via the House office, in certain medical cases some continued absences will be authorised.

Informing us of absence due to illness does not automatically guarantee it will be authorised, this will be determined by the school depending on the student's current attendance levels and whether medical evidence has been provided. We do not require letters from a GP, any medication packaging or an appointment card would be enough.

Thank you for your continued support in ensuring students are in school. Please do not hesitate to contact your son's/daughter's Head of House for support should you need it.
