Forum - The oldest and most important structures of the ancient city are located here, including the temple of Saturn and the complex of the Vestal Virgins. Imagine Cicero or Mark Anthony walking to the Senate House or Rostra and picture Pliny in the Centumviral court. Palatine Hill - The most central of the Seven Hills of Rome is one of the most ancient parts of the city. See the ruins of the Imperial Palaces and the Hut of Romulus, as well as a great view of the Circus Maximus.

According to tradition, Paul's body was buried 2 miles from the place of his martyrdom, in the sepulchral area along the Ostiense Way. During the 4th century Paul's remains, excluding the head, were moved into a sarcophagus.
